Our Local Men on THE WALL

Conrad Alan Sipple

Date of Birth: November 3, 1943
Date of Casualty: March 5, 1966
Branch of Service: Marine Corps
Rank: CPL
Panel/Line: 5E, 124
Casualty Province: Quang Ngai



Cpl. Conrad Sipple United States Marine Corps Company "G" 2DBN 4th Marine Division, was the son of Elmer and Alberta Sipple of Salem. He was killed in the vicinity of Quang Ngai Province, Republic of Vietnam, as a result of a gunshot wound to the chest during heavy fighting March 5, 1966.

He was a graduate of Salem High School, class of 1962, and entered the Marines in 1963. He was on his second tour of duty when he was killed.

Frank Edward McClellan

Date of Birth: April 23, 1949
Date of Casualty: June 4, 1970
Branch of Service: Army
Rank: SP4
Panel/Line: 9W, 8
Casualty Province: Binh Dinh



Specialist Frank E. McClellan was assigned to the 4th Division, Company K, Rangers 1/75th Infantry. He died June 4, 1970, in an accident on the base. He had been wounded once before in action in Vietnam.

He was the son of Lawrence and Bernice McClellan of Salem.

William Henry "Jackie" Myers

Date of Birth: August 18, 1946
Date of Casualty: May 12, 1967
Branch of Service: Marine Corps
Rank: PFC
Panel/Line: 19E/100
Casualty Province: Quang Tin



Jackie Myers was Washington County's third casualty of the Vietnam War. Myers was killed in action in an operation near Quang Tin on May 12, 1967. He joined the Marine Corps in July, 1966 and died after he sustained a gunshot wound to the chest and fragmentation wounds to the body from rifle fire and a mortar round while on operation in Vietnam, according to a telegram to local relatives.

He would have been a senior the year he died had he remained at Salem High School. Military services were conducted by the United State Marine Corps at East Enterprise Cemetery prior to internment. A military escort escorted him to Salem, where services were held at the First Baptist Church.

Jerry Dean Sabens

Date of Birth: May 28, 1946
Date of Casualty: November 21, 1966
Branch of Service: Army
Rank: PFC
Panel/Line: 12E/105
Casualty Province: Unknown



Jerry Sabens, the son of Leroy and Magaline Sabens, was a 1965 graduate of Salem High School. He enlisted in the US Army in January, 1966 and took basic training at Ft. Knox, Kentucky. He later received Airborne training at Fort Benning, Georgia. He was assigned to the 5th Cavalry in Vietnam and reported for duty in that county in early September. He served much of his two and a half months there as a machine gunner in a combat zone.

His parents received notification Thanksgiving morning that he had been killed in action on November 21st, 1966. His body was transferred to Oakland, CA where a member of the military was assigned as escort for the trip to Salem. Funeral services were at First Baptist Church and burial was at Crown Hill Cemetery.

Stephen Gabbard, superintendent of Salem Community Schools at the time noted that Jerry was an above average student and very friendly. EE Martin, whom Jerry had worked, described him as an exceptional boy.

Lieutenant General Michael S. Tucker was born and raised in Charlotte, North Carolina and entered active duty as a Cavalry private in 1972. In 1979, after serving 2 years as a Basic Training Drill Sergeant at Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri, he graduated as the Distinguished Military Graduate from Officer Candidate School, and was commissioned an Armor Second Lieutenant.

Prior to his retirement in September 2016, he served as the Commanding General, First Army, located at Rock Island Arsenal, Rock Island, Illinois, since August 2013, Lieutenant General Tucker had served previously as Commanding General, 2nd Infantry Division, Camp Red Cloud, Republic of Korea, and Commander, 1st Brigade, 1st Armored Division, Friedberg, Germany, which included deployments in support of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM.

Lieutenant General Tucker's award and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal (with 3 Oak Leaf Clusters), Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (with 3 Oak Leaf Clusters), Bronze Star Medal with Oak Leaf and Valor Device, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters), the Expert Infantryman Badge, the Drill Sergeant Identification Badge, the Parachutist Badge, the Department of the Army Staff Badge, and the German Army Ranger Badge.

Lieutenant General Tucker holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Psychology from the University of Maryland, a Master of Science degree in Public Administration from Shippensburg University, Shippensburg, PA, and a Master's Degree in Military Arts and Science from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, Ft. Leavenworth, KS.

He and his wife, Teresa of Charlotte, North Carolina, have 3 children: Meredith, Jason, and Rachel and 6 precious grandchildren: Maddie, Abby, Clayton, Alex, Elli, and Colton. After 44 years of active service, the Tuckers retired on Lake Wylie near Charlotte, North Carolina. Lieutenant General Tucker continues to serve the Army as a Senior Mentor for the Mission Command Training Program, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.

We call your attention to this small table. It is set for one, symbolizing the fact that members of our armed forces are missing from our ranks. They are referred to as POWs and MIAs. **Remember**

We call them comrades. **Remember**

They are unable to be with their loved ones and families this afternoon, so we join together to pay our humble tribute to them, and bear witness to their continued absence. **Remember**

This table, set for one, is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner, alone against his or her suppressors. **Remember**

The tablecloth is white, symbolic of the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms. **Remember**

The single red rose in the vase, signifies the blood they many have shed in sacrifice to ensure the freedom of our beloved United States of America. This rose also reminds us of the family and friends of our missing comrades who keep the faith, while awaiting their return. **Remember**

The yellow ribbon on the vase represents the yellow ribbons worn on the lapels of the thousands who demand with unyielding determination a proper accounting of our comrades who are not among us tonight. **Remember**

A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of their bitter fate. **Remember**

The salt sprinkled on the plate reminds us of the countless fallen tears of families as they wait. **Remember**

The glass is inverted - they cannot toast with us this afternoon. **Remember**

The chair is empty - they are not here. **Remember**

The candle is reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to illuminate their way home, away from their captors, to the open arms of a grateful nation. **Remember**

Let us pray to the supreme commander that all of our comrades will soon be back within our ranks.

Let us remember and never forget their sacrifices.

May God forever watch over them and protect them and their families.

Anne Terrell was born in Vergennes, Vermont during WWII, just before her father was inducted in the Army and served in Europe as the War was ending. Three of her uncles also served in different arenas of that war. Her brother, Barry, served two tours in Vietnam as a medic. Fortunately, all came home. Unfortunately, Vietnam claimed a cousin; Keith Rivers whose name is engraved on this Vietnam Wall. Anne's family has served the military beginning with the American Revolution.

Anne graduated from Stranahan High School in Fort Lauderdale and Florida Atlantic University (BS in Humanities). She received an MS and certification in principalship from Indiana University Southeast.

Anne taught history for three years in Fort Lauderdale, 24 years for Salem Community Schools, and served 8 years on the Salem Board of School Trustees.

Anne is a member of the DAR, PEO, Tri Kappa Associates, Indiana Retired Teachers Association, Washington County Retired Teachers and The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Anne volunteers for Awareness Washington County, PACT Domestic Violence Shelter and the Washington County Community Foundation, and attends Substance Abuse Council meetings. Anne loves traveling, reading, and being with her family, especially her three granddaughters.

First unveiled on November 13, 1982, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial remains an atypical war monument. Its main feature, a V-shaped wall inscribed with the names of over 58,000 U.S. soldiers killed during the Vietnam War, lacks heroic or patriotic symbols, and its polished black granite façade contrasts with the white marble statues and structures surrounding it on the National Mall. Nonetheless, it has become one of the most popular tourist attractions in Washington, D.C.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial was built without government funds.

Jan C. Scruggs, a wounded Vietnam War vet, studied what is now called post-traumatic stress disorder upon his return to the United States. Within a few years, he began calling for a memorial to help with the healing process for the roughly 3 million Americans who served in the conflict. After watching the movie “The Deer Hunter,” Scruggs apparently stepped up his activism even further, using \$2,800 of his own money to form the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund in 1979. Many politicians expressed their support, and the U.S. Congress passed legislation reserving three acres in the northwest corner of the National Mall for a future monument. All donations, however, came from the private sector. By 1981 some 275,000 Americans, along with corporations, foundations, veterans groups, civic organizations and labor unions, had given \$8.4 million to the project.

A college student won the memorial's design contest.

Having raised the necessary cash, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund next held a design contest. The guidelines stipulated that the memorial should contain the names of every American who died in Vietnam or remained missing in action, make no political statement about the war, be in harmony with its surroundings and be contemplative in character. Over 1,400 submissions came in, to be judged anonymously by a panel of eight artists and designers. In the end, the panel passed over every professional architect in favor of 21-year-old Yale University student Maya Lin, who had created her design for a class.

Names are still being added to the memorial.

When the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was first dedicated three decades ago, Lin's wall contained the names of 57,939 American servicemen believed to have lost their lives in the Vietnam War. But since then, that number has jumped to 58,318. In order to be added, a deceased soldier must meet specific U.S. Department of Defense criteria, and those postwar casualties not eligible for inscription on the wall are honored instead with an onsite plaque. Those who are declared dead are denoted by a diamond, and those who are status unknown are denoted with a cross. When the death of one who was previously missing is confirmed, a diamond is superimposed over the cross. If the missing were to return alive, which has never occurred to date, the cross is to be circumscribed by a circle.
